1.0 INTRODUCTION

The improper carriage of dangerous goods by passengers poses a risk to flight safety. Passengers are forbidden from travelling with certain types of dangerous goods such as corrosive substances. Certain other dangerous goods are permitted subject to quantity limits and/or restrictions on where they may be carried on board, which exist to ensure an acceptable level of safety.

Airport operators, air operators and ground handling agents must ensure that information on the types of dangerous goods which passengers are forbidden to transport aboard an aircraft is communicated effectively to them.

This information must be presented at each of the places at an airport where:

1. Tickets are issued,
2. Boarding passes are issued,
3. Passenger baggage is dropped off and aircraft boarding areas are maintained and
4. At any other location where passengers are issued boarding passes and/or checked baggage is accepted.

The information must include visual examples of dangerous goods forbidden from transport aboard an aircraft. The method to provide the required information to passengers is not prescribed but it must be effective. If notices are displayed, their size, number and prominence must provide assurance that a passenger will see them. These factors also apply to the use of TV screens but additionally, if the dangerous goods message is rotated with other information, it needs to have sufficient screen time to be effective. Other supplemental opportunities to provide dangerous goods information to passengers at the airport should be considered including display cabinets containing prohibited dangerous goods and public-address announcements.

The authority has redesigned its poster which may be used at the airport to communicate dangerous goods information to passengers.

The new design aims to more clearly explain the types of dangerous goods which are prohibited, those which may only be carried in the cabin and those which are only permitted on one's person. The poster is provided in portrait and landscape orientation which may be preferable when displayed on TV screens.

Printing for physical display needs to be to a good standard and the notices should be resistant to or protected from damage through wear and tear.



2.0 PROHIBITED ITEMS IN HAND LUGGAGE.

2.1 Devices that can be used or appear to be used to cause serious damage by projectile launch, including:

- all types of firearms (pistols, revolvers, rifles, rifles);
- toy weapons, children, and imitations of firearms, which can be confused with real weapons.
- parts of firearms, except telescopic sightings.
- missile launchers; starting pistols; toy guns and rifles of all kinds.
- compressed air and CO2 weapons (pistols, shotguns, rifles, rifles and ball guns);
- bows, crossbows, and arrows.
- harpoons and harpoons launchers.
- slingshots and catapults.

2.2 Devices specially designed to paralyze or immobilize, including:

- electric shock devices such as electric shock guns, tasers and electric shock rods;
- stunning devices and devices for killing animals.
- neutralizing and disabling chemicals, gases and sprays such as irritant-tear sprays, pepper sprays, hot pepper sprays, tear gas, acid sprays and repellent sprays for animals.

2.3 Objects that can be used to cause serious injury when used to strike, including:

- baseball and softball bats.
- sticks.
- martial arts specific equipment.

2.4 Tools that can be used both to cause serious injury and to endanger the safety of the aircraft, including:

- crumbs;
- drills and drill bits, including portable electric cordless drills;
- blade or rod tools longer than 6 cm, such as screwdrivers and chisels;
- saws, including portable electric chainsaws;
- welding burners;
- bolt-action pistols and nail guns.

2.5 Prohibited items in hand luggage and hold baggage:

Explosive and incendiary substances and devices that may be used or appear to be used to cause serious injury or danger to the safety of the aircraft, including:

- ammunition;
- detonating boxes;



- detonators and wicks;
- copies or imitations of explosive devices;
- mines, grenades and other military explosive devices;
- fireworks and other pyrotechnic articles;
- smoke bombs and smoke cartridges;
- dynamite, gunpowder and plastic explosives.

CAREFUL! Many of the prohibited items in hand luggage can be taken in hold baggage. As mentioned above, these lists are open and can always be supplemented with products like those listed.

2.6 Items Prohibited in Both the Carry-on Baggage and Checked Baggage.

NCAA rules also command that any items that are not essential to the passenger's well-being while airborne should not be packed in both the checked baggage and carry-on baggage. For instance, recreational oxygen cylinders that are not required by the passengers as a result of underlying medical conditions are entirely prohibited from carriage in either baggage. Likewise, prohibited are spillable batteries that are not for the purpose of powering devices like wheelchairs that passengers depend on for their well-being. The same restrictions will apply for tear gas sprays meant for self-defense if they have a mass of more than 2%.


Additionally, NCAA rules ban the following items for carriage in both the checked baggage and carry-on baggage without any conditions. They include Gasoline, Vehicle airbags, Turpentine, gas torches, strike anywhere matches, spray paints, replicas of explosives, liquid bleach, chlorine, and dynamite.
